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OUR JOURNEY

All We Can is an organisation with a tradition of challenging injustice, and striving for a world where every community has the power, dignity, and resources to lead their own futures.

All We Can was founded by the Methodist Church in the 1930s, and we're proud to continue the legacy of making meaningful, positive and sustainable difference to people's lives.



1930s

Methodist minister **Henry Carter** pioneers Methodist Refugee Fund to improve conditions for refugees, particularly in Austria and Germany

1940s

Became known as the **Methodist Relief Fund (MRF)**



1950s

Supported the building of **Wesley Village** in Hong Kong following civil war in China



1960s

Supported Methodist agricultural colleges in Tonga and Haiti

1980s

World Development Fund and MRF merged to form **Methodist Relief and Development Fund (MRDF)**

1990s

MRDF income reaches **£1m** for first time and now supports work in over 50 countries

2000s

The Boxing Day tsunami in 2004 resulted in the biggest emergency appeal response to date, raising **£1.5m**

2010s

MRDF becomes known as **All We Can** on 8th April 2014



PRESENT DAY

All We Can works in long-term partnerships with 20 local organisations in six countries, and Methodist churches in four regions. We continue to respond to crises around the world, by supporting humanitarian organisations in times of emergency.

- We are reliable partners investing in financial sustainability.
- Our local Country Reps work with partners close to the point of impact, committed for the long-term.
- We support local partners to invest in their capacity, so they are stronger for the future.
- We invest in and help build social enterprises that provide reliable and flexible income.
- As a small organisation we are a better partner - more responsive, adaptable

WE LEVERAGE THE VALUE OF UNRESTRICTED INCOME

- We offer flexible and unrestricted funding to our partners
- We ensure investment can also be made in partner Organisational Development(OD) and core running costs .
- We go against the grain and stand behind our approach, at the expense of an easy funding stream.
- Unrestricted funds allow us to advocate for the decolonisation of philanthropy.

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THE WORLD WE LIVE IN...

- ✘ Facing a **polycrisis** - climate change, biodiversity loss, polarisation, growing inequality, increased conflict and violence
- ✘ Countries becoming more **authoritarian and insular**
- ✘ Human rights and development **gains being rolled back**
- ✘ A **new world order** - the world becoming more volatile and uncertain
- ✘ Negative impact of **reduced Overseas Development Assistance and crippling debt servicing**
- ✘ **Sustainable Development Goals off-track** - failing on key targets around poverty, hunger and climate
- ✘ The most vulnerable and marginalised being forgotten, with more than **half the world being left behind**

- » Opportunity to build much needed greater solidarity & counter the narrative and systems that divide us.
- » Faith continues to shape societies and how they interact with notions of development or disasters, holding a unique trait of being locally rooted and globally networked.

THE PROBLEM TO SOLVE...

**POWER AND RESOURCES HELD IN THE WRONG
HANDS ARE HOLDING LOCAL ORGANISATIONS
AND COMMUNITIES BACK:**

- » Community priorities are overridden by top-down restricted aid
- » Local actors struggle to meet overly-stringent compliance, forcing them out of access to international funding and perpetuating colonial norms
- » If they somehow access funding, local actors are straight-jacketed with short term, project based funding
- » Short-termism. Projects, rather than strategic planning, blocks transformation
- » Decades of NGOs plugging service gaps - fuelled by international funding incentives - is not sustainable
- » The current model undermines the capacity and resilience of local organisations
- » Donors typically treat capacity development as a secondary concern or admin overhead

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IN COMMUNITIES PEOPLE ARE:

- » Trapped in cycles of poverty
- » Enduring growing inequality, reduced agency and stifled opportunities.
- » They remain trapped as passive recipients rather than active agents, and are at increased risk of exclusion and oppression.

THE POWER OF LOCAL

We believe people are best placed to create change in their own communities. This belief unlocks potential ensuring inherent abilities and talents are discovered and developed and amplifies agency. We know that when change is locally led, it is more impactful and sustainable. This requires us to facilitate local solutions with local change makers.

JUST SOCIETIES

We are all made in the image of God, each worthy of equal value and dignity. God wills the flourishing of creation and human community within it. We believe, that in solidarity with others, we are called to challenge injustice, dismantling structures that perpetuate inequality. *This requires us to become justice seeking.*

FUNDING EQUITY

We argue for more direct and unrestricted funding to local organisations, that is more transparent, flexible, and trusting of local partners. We treat each other with mutual respect, solidarity and humility. This requires us to shift power.

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WE DO THIS THROUGH:

...maximising the impact with local changemakers, over the long term, rooted in community agency, justice, and self determination – until we've done all we can!

- » Shifting power to communities who create their own solutions for lasting change
- » Working in solidarity with local changemakers leveraging the power of locally led solutions
- » Engaging the sector to decolonise and scaling a locally led approach (CCM)
- » Seeking justice and growing the movement to remove barriers that hold us all back (aid system, climate crisis, debt, conflict)
- » Protecting precious development gains through creating resilience and responding to emergencies
